It all began in the mid 19th century--the idea of "rescuing" orphaned, homeless and abandoned children from the streets of New York and sending them west to live with families. Over the next 75 years, approximately 250, 000 children would be part of this influential social experiment.

This presentation will look at the origin, philosophy, success, failure and controversy associated with America's orphan trains.
